No one quite anticipated what kind of year 2020 ended up being. What a way to round out Triumph's first 60 years of existence! Throughout 2020, Triumph did what it has always done every year since 1961: we gave our all to serve the people of Central Washington.

We believe Triumph is the definition of resilience and innovation. Can you believe we started as a hub of community information in the 1970s and have since opened nearly a dozen treatment centers? In the mid-1980s James Oldham Treatment Center (JOTC) opened, providing well-rounded inpatient services for men while we continued to find more ways to offer outpatient services to what was previously known as "aftercare" for those who have graduated from their inpatient treatment. Throughout the 1990s and the 2000s, we pioneered and took the initiative to bring services to women and mothers in our communities. Thanks to these steps Riel House, Casita, Beth's Place and Inspirations came to be. At Triumph, we see the needs of the community and we find ways to meet those needs.

Though it has been far from easy, our staff and patients have continued to engage in our services and programs. We have shown up every day and walked out our passionate purpose: to make hope and new life possible. When COVID-19 hit our community, some of our staff were sent to work from home, but most stayed. Where would our patients be if we didn't come to work? Who would care for them?

We temporarily closed our admissions because it was the right thing to do in order to safely manage our programs. Throughout the adversity of closing admissions, we found new ways to offer services to our community. We invested in telehealth training and equipment and learned how to care for our patients remotely through Zoom conferences and phone calls. We likely contributed to the #1 most spoken statement in America: "You're on mute." We set up wi-fi in our parking lots so patients could access treatment, and we began weekly all-staff meetings over Zoom to keep everyone up to date on the latest news about COVID-19 and its impact on our programs.

None of us could have predicted all that happened in 2020, but we now know that we will show up for this work, no matter what! We survived one of our toughest years and made it through stronger and ready for more. We loved each other through the hardships, and we walked with each other through the fear. Through all of this, we supported patients with over 184,000 services and 96,000 appointments over 70,000 hours. *So here's to 60 years of Triumph!*

These counselors have experienced their own mental health and/or substance use disorder challenges and are now living in recovery. This makes them uniquely equipped to provide support, encouragement, and understanding for clients at Triumph.

Certified Peer Counselors will work with patients as they address health, substance use, and community recovery needs. They can provide:

- referrals for domestic violence services
- education on nicotine cessation and parenting skills
- resources and advocacy to positively impact social determinants of health

Certified Peer Counselors have training and experience in motivational interviewing, substance use disorder treatment and recovery, effects of substance use disorders on parenting and children, mental health and co-occurring disorders, medication-assisted treatment, and child development.

We believe these new Peer Counselors will help make a profound difference in the recovery process for our clients. Their perspectives and experiences will be invaluable for patients who are going through our services.

Expanding Programs for Children and Families



Genesis Center is becoming a reality thanks to donations and several grants received over the past two years.

Triumph dubbed the fundraising effort Genesis Project, and began work to build a new therapeutic childcare center in 2019. Programs at the Center will serve children from birth to pre-K. We will serve families participating in Washington Connections Child Care, which helps low income families pay for quality childcare. The building opens in winter of 2021.

The new Genesis Center will:

- Provide bus and van pickup and drop-off for families who lack transportation
- Provide care for up to 46 children
- Provide an evidence-based curriculum
- Provide a safe and secure playground and community garden residential families can access seven days a week
- Allow us to prepare nutritious meals on campus with a state of the art commercial kitchen
- Provide a cafeteria for parents and children to enjoy meals together
- Offer a safe environment for family education, support, and recreational use




Triumph's New Brand
